

THE PROCESS

- Develop and implement municipal Deer Feeding Bylaw
- Conduct an Urban Deer Resident Survey
- Establish an Urban Deer Management Advisory Committee
- Conduct an Urban Deer population count
- Present Committee Recommendations to Council

Deer Feeding Bylaw 3709, 2010

- Adopted by Council September 13, 2010
- Into effect October 1, 2010
- No one is to provide deer with food by intentionally leaving food, food waste or edible material or other attractive edible material intended for the sole purpose of feeding deer.
- Farm operations, home fruit and vegetable gardens intended for human consumption or ornamental plants and flowers not included.



1. How concerned are you about the deer population in Cranbrook?



Resident Survey Highlights

2. What are your main concerns regarding the deer herd in Cranbrook? (Multiple answers requested)

- deer/vehicle collisions (16.82%)
- deer damage to vegetables, flowers, plantings (17.36%) ■ human health risks from deer (9.74%)
- overall health and well-being of the deer herd (7.36%)
- overpopulation of the deer herd
- deer aggression towards humans (19.22%)
- deer aggression towards pets (13.56%)

■ no concerns (2.33%)


22. In the future, what would you like to happen to the number of deer in Cranbrook?



- slight increase (about 10%) (2.39%)
- moderate increase (about 30 to 40%) (0.69%)
- substancial increase (more than 40%) (0.39%)
- stay the same (12.58%)
- slight decrease (down about 10%) (4.40%)
- moderate decrease (down about 30 to 40%) (12.89%)
- substancial decrease (more than 40%) (62.50)
- don't know (4.17%)


37. Capture and euthanize

Management Advisory Committee

Committee established by Council October 4, 2010. The scope of work established under Terms of Reference included:

- Assess the results of the public survey
- Coordinate a count of the urban deer population within the boundaries of the City
- Identify acceptable options for population management
- Identify strategies for management of human/deer conflicts
- Present final recommendations to Council.

Committee Deer Count Results

- City-wide deer count conducted by Committee members and volunteers over three consecutive Saturdays in Nov. 2010
- Average of 92 deer (white-tail and mule deer) observed City wide; 82 of those counted were mule deer
- Total density of mule deer in City of Cranbrook: 3.3 deer/ km²

By comparison, the City of Kimberley (20 deer/km²)

Recommended density in Helena, Montana (9.6 deer/km²)

Committee Recommendations



- Public education campaign
- Key Message: "Deer are always going to be a part of life in Cranbrook"
- Campaign to provide information on how to deal with deer issues, including yard and garden damage, aggression, mule deer life c and information on deterrents



Committee Recommendations



- Cull Problem Deer
- Identified as short-term solution focused on a where incidents have been reported
- Reduce "problem urban centre herd" by 10 to percent or 10 to 12 animals based on deer co results



Other Committee Recommendations

- · Capture and Relocate
- · Controlled Perimeter Mule Deer doe hunt
- Monitoring: establish Deer Management Advisory
 Committee as an on-going body to assess and monitor urban deer issues and report annually to Council




















STRATEGY SUMMARY

- Submitted to Province for consideration on April 6, 2011
- Requests of both MOE and Ministry of Forests, Land and

Natural Resource Operations included:

- Commit funds and staff resources to proposed strategy
- Purchase and maintain ten clover traps & equipment and these items be shared with other municipalities
- MOF commit use of local facility to keep culled


WHERE WE ARE NOW?

- Province has committed staff time and funds to secure clover
- traps and required equipment as strategy presented.
- By resolution of Council, City has set aside funds to hire
 - contractor to conduct the work.
- Required Provincial permit application submitted; expecting
 - permit by end of September; followed shortly after by tendering/hiring of contractor services.
- Problem deer cull could be completed between late
 November 2011 and early February 2012

- Public Survey key to success of entire process
- · Diverse and transparent Committee
- · Make important decisions in public forum
